Design Hacks From the Frontlines

Creating protest visuals that survive algorithm purges requires ninja-level strategy:

Platform-shifting palettes: Use HEX codes that pop on both Instagram Stories and newsprint

Steganography 2.0: Hide scannable AR triggers in the bull's horn patterns

Memetic durability: Test designs through Reddit roast sessions before launch

When Corporations Try to Co-Opt the Movement

In a bizarre twist, April 2024 saw crypto exchanges and energy drink brands attempting to parody the Stand by Bull OPzS Bloc Banner. The activist community's response? A masterclass in brand-jacking:
